WHAT IS EQIP?

The Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) is a voluntary conservation program that promotes agricultural production and environmental quality as goals for producers. Farmers, producers, and landowners may receive financial and technical assistance to help install structural practices and management conservation practices on their land. Below is a list of common problems that may be addressed utilizing the EQIP Program.

WHAT ARE THE INCENTIVES?

EQIP offers landowners the opportunity to receive significant cost reimbursements for many conservation improvements on their farms, fields, or forests. Limited resource, veteran, and beginning farmers may be eligible for a higher percentages of certain conservation practices.

Application Process

Applications are accepted throughout the year.

Contact NRCS to discuss the following:

- 1) The application process
- 2) Your conservation needs on the farm
- 3) Planned practices and incentives
- 4) The ranking and selection timeline

If your project meets eligibility requirements, applications will be ranked and selected for contract funding accordingly. After contracting, NRCS provides all of the necessary design assistance and construction oversight. An incentive payment will be made via direct deposit at completion.

Producer is responsible for the long-term operation and maintenance of the cost shared practice.
